and listen to the teachers.



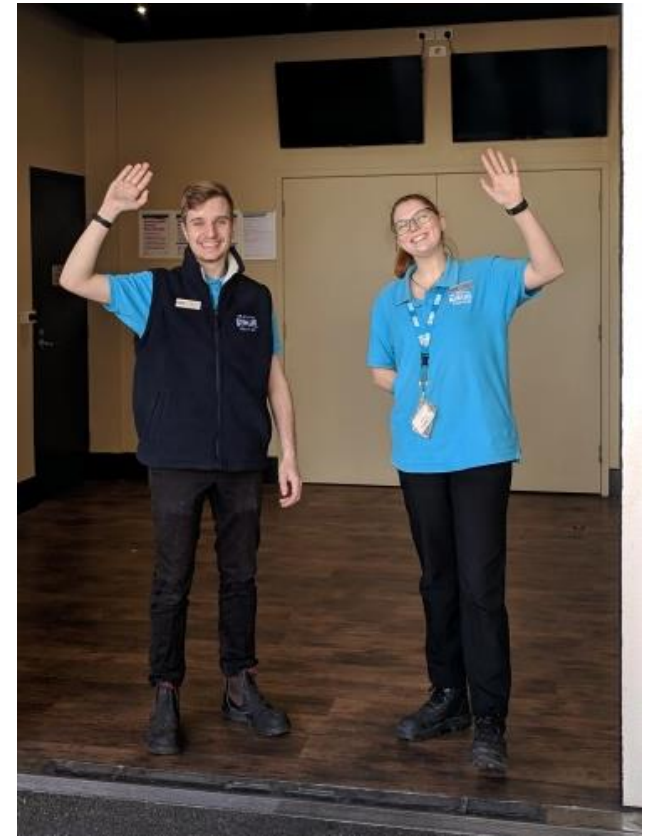
When we arrive, we will meet our Aquarium teachers at the school door. If we have bags, we will put them in the white lockers so they are safe.

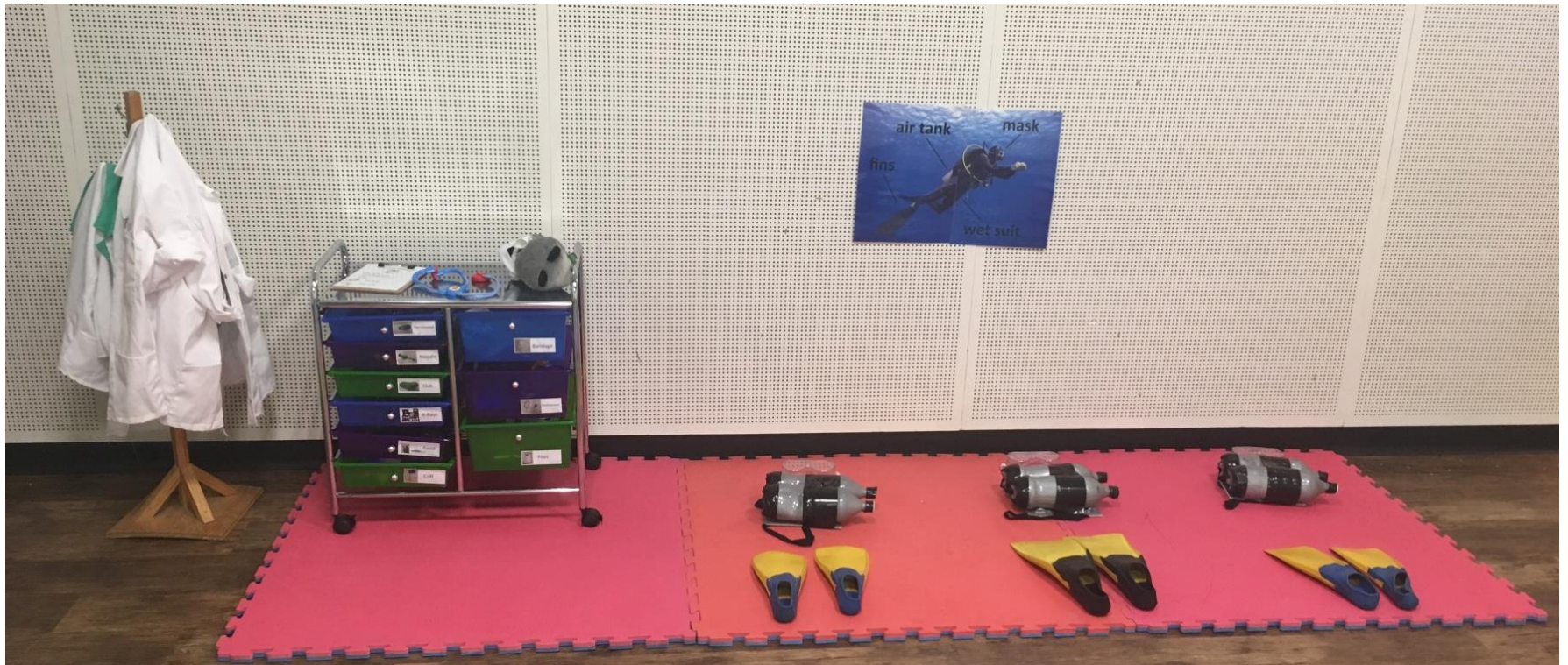
There are lots of different animals that we might see.

Some of the animals are big, some are small. They are all behind glass so I can get very close and be safe.



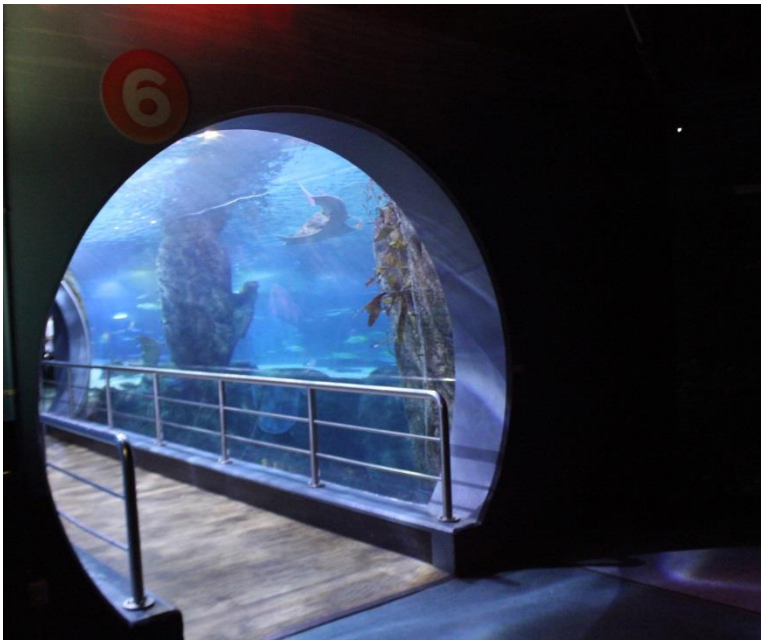
At the rock pools, I will be asked if I would like to touch a sea star, they feel rough and wet.

I will use my quiet voice, even though it may be noisy inside. Some places can be dark and if it makes me feel uncomfortable, I will tell my adult.



Once we have finished looking at the exhibits, we might go into the cinema if the teacher says its okay. The movie is loud with wind and snow blowing around sometimes. If I don't like it, I can leave with my adult.
